The primary objective of this grant is to demonstrate effective methods for structuring and crafting valuable instructional materials using the Pacing Guides found in the Curriculum Resources Group within Schoology. By providing educators with essential insights and tools for establishing organized folders and creating engaging content, this initiative aims to significantly empower teachers.

Utilizing the information provided will enable teachers to seamlessly integrate their individually designed instructional resources directly into the Schoology platform, thereby elevating the quality of their pedagogical approaches. Introduction

Schoology Course Materials Icons



Files

Upload different types of files stored on your computer or drive directly to your course Materials page.



Assignments

Use Assignments to collect, view and grade student submissions. With the use of [Annotated Assignments](#) students can now annotate directly on the added resource such as a PDF, JPEG, PowerPoint, Word document, etc. to complete their teacher created assignment.




Assessments

[Create assessments](#) in your Schoology course to assess your students' grasp of the material or evaluate their preparedness for class. Each assessment is automatically graded (unless you have included a subjective question), providing you with instant and powerful feedback that can help guide your upcoming lesson plans.



Links

Add a link to your Materials page to create a central location for the webpages for online reading, videos, and tools you use in class.



External Tools

External or LTI (Learning Tools Interoperability) Tools enable your web-based resources to be accessed and viewed within Schoology.



Lock

Lock an assignment to prevent submissions to the item.

Discussions



Create a discussion to enable your students to interact with each other and discuss the material while evaluating their participation. Students add threaded comments, reply to one another, and like their peers' posts.

Pages



Create a custom Page to add text, images, videos, and HTML to present information to your students. Each page has a Rich Text Editor that enables you to customize font styles, colors, indentations, and other options.



Media Albums

Create albums to organize and share photos, videos, and/or audio files for your course.

Folders



Create folders to organize your course content.



Question Banks for Test/Quiz

Use Question Banks to create a repository of test questions that you can then use within Tests/Quizzes. You can create question banks in Personal and Group Resources.



Items Banks for Course Assessment

Use Item Banks to create a repository of assessment questions that you can then use within Course Assessments. You can create item banks in Personal and Group Resources.




Display on a New Page/ Display Inline

Disable this for your material to display on a new page or enable it for the item to display inline on your course Materials page.



Align with a Learning Objective

Click the blue target to align the material with a custom or standardized learning goal to track students' progress in the Mastery gradebook.



Individually Assign

Assign an item to a specific student or grading group.



Add a Rubric

Add a rubric to measure student performance against multiple criteria.

Teacher Tips for Content Creation in Schoology

When creating content in Schoology, here are some helpful tips to ensure an engaging and effective learning experience for students:

1. **Clear Learning Objectives:** Begin by defining clear learning objectives for each content piece. What do you want your students to achieve or understand after completing the material? This will help you structure your content effectively.

2. **Organize with Folders:** Use folders to keep your course materials organized. Group related content together and provide clear titles and descriptions for easy navigation.

3. **Use Multimedia:** Incorporate various multimedia elements such as images, videos, audio, and interactive elements. These can enhance engagement and cater to different learning styles. For example, creating a spelling test. Go to this YouTube video tutorial to see how to create a self-graded spelling test:



4. **Chunk Information:** Break down your content into smaller, manageable chunks. This makes it easier for students to digest the information and helps them stay focused.

5. **Interactive Assessments:** Integrate quizzes, polls, and other interactive assessments within your content to gauge student understanding and provide immediate feedback.

6. **Promote Collaboration:** Encourage collaboration and discussion among students by using features like Discussion or group activities within Schoology. Remember you can always moderate Schoology

created Discussions by clicking on the **Course Options** and selecting **Moderate Posts**. See below:



7. **Mobile-Friendly Design:** Ensure that your content is mobile-friendly, as many students may access the materials on their devices.

8. **Accessibility Considerations:** Keep accessibility in mind when creating content. Use alt text for images and ensure that all students can access the material regardless of their abilities. Try not to use images of text-related content so students can use the Immersive Reader option.

9. **Consistent Format:** Maintain a consistent format and layout throughout your content. This helps students focus on the material rather than navigating different styles.

10. **Provide Clear Directions and Instructions:** Do not assume every student will be in class when they are completing your assignment, project, or classwork. Write your directions for completing the assignment as if students were absent and not in class to avoid confusion. Use concise language and avoid jargon or complex terminology that students may not understand.

11. **Provide Resources:** Include additional resources or references for students who want to explore the topic further.

12. **Create Grading Groups for Differentiated Instruction:** Click on **Members** on the left navigation rail and then on the upper right-hand side of the page, select **Add Grading Groups** to help organize your differentiated instructional groups.

13. **Update Regularly:** Review and update your content regularly to keep it relevant and accurate.

14. **Seek Student Feedback:** Encourage students to provide feedback on the content and course structure. This will help you refine and improve your materials over time.

15. **Monitor Engagement:** Use Schoology's analytics and data to track student engagement with the content. This will give you insights into what works well and what may need improvement.

16. **Use Workload Planning:** Before assigning due dates, click on Workload Planning from the left navigation rail to ensure your students' workload for their other classes does not coincide with your assignment, projects, or assessments. Note, if not all teachers are using Schoology in your school, you will not get a clear perspective of your students' workload.

By following these tips, teachers can create compelling and effective content in Schoology that fosters a positive learning environment and helps students succeed in their educational journey.
